WHAT IS the USDFRC? What are multifunctional farms, resilient landscapes?

In March via Zoom we heard from Dr. Alison Duff, a Research Ecologist and a

member of the dairy systems research team at the US Dairy Forage Research Center (USDFRC). The DFRC has labs on the UW campus and a 400 cow dairy herd, 1300 acres of cropland and 900 acres of pastures and perennials north of Prairie du Sac. Alison describes multifunctional farms in measures that include not only productivity and profitability, but also an array of ecosystem services. The latter include soil carbon storage, food production, pollinator benefits, greenhouse gas emissions, water infiltration, reduction of soil loss, and more. Many of the ecosystem services may provide direct benefits to farms such as reduced need for fertilizer, improved water infiltration, or reduced predation. Resilience in landscapes refers to their capacity to withstand or adapt to a sustained disturbance such as climate change.



Dr. Duff outlined her own research on silvopasture, the practice of grazing permanent pastures on landscapes containing trees.

Alison envisions three paradigm shifts for agricultural systems research: A) move from production and profitability as the primary metrics of assessment to multiple farm-scale metrics including nitrous oxide (N2O) reduction, nitrate (NO3) retention, soil carbon storage, erosion control, pest suppression, and pollinator conservation, B) shift from distinct/separate research on croplands and non-croplands to a farmscape view that integrates agricultural sciences and landscape ecology, C) shift from originating research at the lab then communicating results to producers to "co-production of research" that continuously engages producers in developing objectives and conducting the research followed by outreach. This was a thought-provoking view of ongoing and future research. Demeter wishes Alison a productive, impactful future in dairy systems research.

<u>DAIRY INNOVATION HUB</u> Maria Woldt, Program Manager

Wisconsin continues to have more dairy farms than any other state at slightly less than 6500 farms, and



ranks first nationally in cheese production. More than 90% of the milk from nearly 1.3 million cows goes into cheese. The dairy industry overall generates about \$45 billion in economic activity for the state of Wisconsin. The Dairy Innovation Hub (DIH) provides nearly \$8 million of state funds toward support of the dairy industry through investments at UW-Madison, UW-Platteville, and UW-River Falls. The four pillars of the DIH are Animal Health & Welfare, Human Health & Nutrition, Farm Business & Community, and Land & Water. By July 2021 more than 100 funding awards had been approved in the four priority areas. Researchers have published results, given presentations and participated in patent applications. Five new faculty members have been hired at UW-Madison in the following areas: dairy economics, human health & nutrition, land & water stewardship, and rumen microbial physiology. UW-Madison faculty hires are in progress in immunology and dairy food science and the DIH supports another three faculty members at UW-Madison in Animal & Dairy Sciences and one in Nutritional Sciences. Similar efforts are on -going at UW-Platteville and UW-River Falls.

Allen Centennial Garden

While awaiting construction of our new Wyman Kitchen Garden at Allen Centennial Garden, community partners have helped bring our kitchen garden to life with a Hmong herb gar-



den, an African diasporic vegetable garden, and a Three Sisters Garden grown from Oneida seeds. You might recognize corn, beans, and squash in the Three Sisters Garden, but other plants may be more surprising. In the African garden celosia is growing as a leafy green for salads, but you might know it as a great edging flower. Another difference is that all three of these gardens are planted in clumps or artistic groupings which allows them to help each other grow and provides an opportunity for a colorful living design.

At a Harvest Festival on October 8, ACG will host multiple performances from Hmong, African, Indigenous, Slavic, and Scandinavian musicians, dancers, and storytellers. Plus, students will share their research and family traditions. Join us for this free community event!
