# SCHOLARSHIPS!

Students didn't have to wait 50 years for an exciting win, but they are definitely excited to be returning to inperson classes and participating in student activities after a year and half of virtual learning. It is also exciting to share that Demeter will be providing \$38,000 of financial support to CALS students as they return for the 2021-2022 academic year. This year Demeter has reallocated study abroad funding (unused in 2020-2021) to offer two new need-based scholarships. Additionally, increased funding will be directed to the Allen Garden and West Madison internships. While it is important for members to be updated on support being provided, it is equally important to share words of gratitude received by students.

## STUDENT SUPPORT FUND SHOWS GENEROSITY OF DEMETER MEMBERS

In 1979 the endowment book value (the amount donated) of the Demeter Education Fund at the UW Foundation was **\$3000**. It then had a market value of **\$3078** and the amount available for student support from interest earnings was \$48.46.

As of June 1, 2021 the endowment book value (amount donated plus unspent interest) was **\$37,422.87**. The fund had a market value of **\$74,719.52** with estimated annual earnings (amount available for student support) of about \$3000. This fund provides student support in addition to that from named scholarships.

President Sally Leong was chatting with a young lady sitting next to her at a J Henry fundraising dinner. Sally was surprised to learn that it was Kristin Olson, the 2013/14 Alice, an AWA Demeter scholar who remembered speaking at the Corn Roast. She is currently the Director of Communications at Cooperative Network.
